


Your council, your services, your money Reading Borough Council's budget for 2020/21



About the Budget

The Council's budget pays for day-to-day services such as waste and recycling, planning, transport, highways, street cleaning, parks, playgrounds, libraries, environmental health, children's services and adult social care. The Council has set a budget of £425 million for 2020/21. Council Tax raises £96 million - just under a quarter of the total. The rest is funded from a range of sources including Business Rates, income from fees and charges, and funding from grants. The Council also has a capital budget that is used to invest in the town to maintain and improve roads, parks, council homes, leisure facilities and community assets.



Your Council Tax helps to pay for services delivered by Reading Borough Council, Thames Valley Police and the Royal Berkshire Fire and Rescue service. In 2020/21 the Council's element of Council Tax will increase by 3.99%, an increase of approximately £1.25 per week for a Band D property.

The change is made up of a 1.99% increase in general Council Tax and a 2% increase to help fund social care. This Adult Social Care Precept has been created by the Government and allows Councils that provide social care to adults to increase their share of Council Tax to help fund the rising costs of that care. For 2020/21 the Government has allowed an Adult Social Care Precept of up to an additional 2%, which will raise an extra £1.8 million, equivalent to 935 hours of homecare and 1030 hours of supported living a week for vulnerable adults in Reading.



Weekly food waste collections start during 2020

In Reading we recycle 35% of our household waste, our aim is to recycle at least 50%.

Reading Borough Council is introducing weekly food waste collections and also replacing grey wheeled bins with smaller 140 litre black wheeled bins for most properties during 2020
